2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student-centric methods such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem-solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences:

Choice Based Credit System (CBCS), Outcome Based Education, Blended Learning and Bloom's Taxonomy has been employed to enrich students and cater their diverse needs. As NEP-2020 has been implemented in First and second years of degree programmes, the teaching has become more innovative, student based, practical and thought provoking in approach.

Experiential learning- Learning through Experimenting is the best way to understand the concepts. Regular Practical Classes, Field Visits, Internships, Hands on trainings, Industry Visits are regularly conducted to provide first-hand knowledge.

Participative learning- Students' participation in learning process make them confident and stimulate their thinking process. Various learning platforms as Whatsapp groups with teachers, Google meets, interactive lectures, google forms, preparation and presentation of topics by teachers and advanced learners and their presentation in class provide a way to learning.

Problem-solving methodologies - Such methodologies help students in sharpening their edges. Case studies and their analysis, projects related to local and global problems, community problems and their solutions, mind mapping, chart and models making, creation of working models and their display, logical analysis, collaborative learning and many such activities were employed to enhance learning skills.

During the pandemic time teachers had explored new vistas of online education. ICT in education has become key instrument in the delivery of teaching and learning methods at all stages of education and across all ideas of the curriculum. College has its website where notices, events are made available. 21 class rooms and laboratories are ICT enabled with LCD projectors. This campus is Wi-Fi enabled. All teaching faculty members are actively using various ICT tools like they have developed their own educational video links, which are available on website. writing online flipped classroom system for better understanding of the subject. YouTube video module made by teachers are also available. Various faculty members have gone through vigorous training on E-content development by Department of Higher Education, Government of Madhya Pradesh. They have developed E-content containing all the 4 Quadrants. These E-content modules are available on the website of DHE, and students can access these modules anytime. Similarly, PPTs created by faculty members are also available on college website.
